Advisory By Guest - Cervical Cancer Awareness

As part of the Awareness Club's initiative, we invited Dr. K. Srilakshmi, an Obstetrician and Gynecologist, to speak to us about cervical cancer. I had helped design a poster and a pamphlet for the event, which made me even more eager to attend.

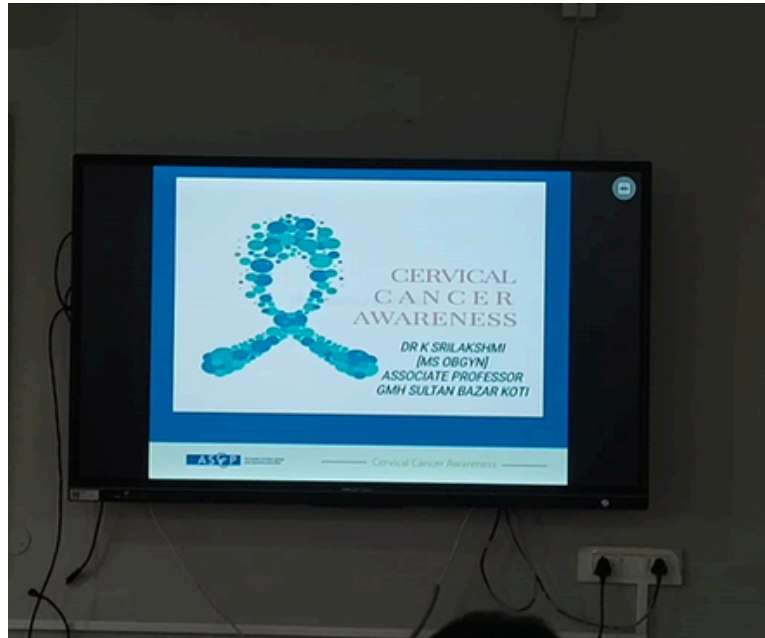
Dr. Srilakshmi began by asking if we knew what cervical cancer was, then addressed why many avoid visiting a gynecologist for anything other than pregnancy — often due to stigma or misconceptions. I was surprised to learn that cervical cancer is almost entirely preventable if detected early through regular screening. It is caused by the Human Papillomavirus (HPV), which is primarily but is not exclusively transmitted sexually. Though commonly recognised for causing cervical cancer, it can also cause other cancers, including certain types in men.

She explained risk factors such as skipping regular Pap tests from age 21, smoking, poor diet, HIV, and having multiple sexual partners. She emphasized the importance of vaccination around the time of puberty, which protects against the high-risk HPV strains most likely to cause cancer. We also learned about the different HPV vaccines, as well as screening methods like Pap tests and biopsies.

Dr. Srilakshmi ended the advisory with a powerful call to action: “Get screened, get vaccinated, and educate.” This session reminded me how valuable awareness can be in breaking stigma and encouraging women to speak up.
