


University Visit # 1 Ashoka University



IB DP Orientation for Grade 10 Parents & Students

IB Admissions department, had conducted the DP orientation for parents and students of grade 10 JGS ICSE on 6th August Saturday. IB DPC Ms. Vidhya Bhaskar briefed the parents and students on the IB Curriculum and its benefits. Our grade 11 IB Student representatives Adithishree and PR Aditya shared their experiences and the way IB curriculum is delivered at Johnson. They also shared their subject choices, the learning process and most importantly why they chose Johnson IB over other curriculums.









During the question-and-answer session our COO, DPC, IB Career Counselor, IB Student representatives and IB Admission Officer answered questions from the parents in regard to why one must opt for IB, IB recognition in India, IB students' eligibility for entrance and university admissions in India.

Assessment Policy in the DP

DPC, Ms. Vidhya Bhaskar, conducted a session for the parents of IB Grade 11 on 10th August, 2022 on how and when the assessments will be done in DP for the academic year 2022 – 2023. Parents were briefed on the number of formative and summative assessments, the assessment model and how the weightage of the assessment will be calculated for grade 11. Parents were informed that the exam date and syllabus will be notified to the students in advance and how parents can check the managebac for information on examinations and deadlines.

The **International Baccalaureate Organization** has a review and evaluation policy every 5 years. The main objective of the evaluation of IB programs is to help schools continuously develop their capacity to implement IB programs, in order to have a greater effect on student outcomes through the development of teaching practices and leadership. Towards this end, the school needs to review its existing policies and practices and ensure it aligns with IB philosophy. Later on in the academic year, we will invite parents to information sessions on IB practices followed at Johnson Grammar School.

Every Wednesday and Thursdays are Professional Development afternoons. Teachers collaborate to collect evidence of IB practices as well as designing unit plans to complete the curriculum in a timely manner.

TOK Show and Tell - 18th Aug

The students of the TOK 2 class participated in a Show and Tell activity on August 18. They presented objects that represented them as knowers and their knowledge journey. A wide range of interesting objects were showcased and described.
